

CAROW, ISAAC—No. 15 (1778–1850). Member of the Chamber, 1817–50; Vice-President, 1827–40; President, 1840–42; came to New York in 1793; deeply interested in public affairs and spent much money in charitable ways; shipping merchant in the West India trade; portrait presented by members of the Chamber, painted in 1865 by Henry Peters Gray after a miniature.

CASWELL, JOHN—No. 115 (1797–1871). Came to New York in 1811; entered the business of an uncle; established the house of John Caswell & Co. about 1836, one of the representative houses in the China trade; portrait presented by Charles S. Smith, painted in 1890 by Thomas W. Wood after an original by Eastman Johnson.

CHADWICK, CHARLES NOYES—No. 233 (1849–1920). Member of the Chamber, 1906–20; Chairman, Committee on Conservation of State Waters, Lands and Forests, 1911–20; known as the “Father of the Catskill Aqueduct”, having spent eight years in continual presentation of bills at Albany and in addressing civic bodies before securing his object; Commissioner, Board of Water Supply, 1905–20; a pioneer and unremitting worker in the cause of education; founder Froebel Academy, 1880; portrait presented by Mrs. Chadwick, painted in 1924 by William Chadwick.
