Dodge, William E. (2nd)—No. 38 (1832–1903). Member of the Chamber, 1860–1903; Vice-President, 1894–95; 1899–1903; became partner in Phelps, Dodge & Co.; was member of the New York State Commission to supervise the condition of the troops in the field during the Civil War; had many and varied interests; portrait presented by Mr. Dodge, painted in 1896 from life by Daniel Huntington.

Dows, David—No. 155 (1814–1890.) Member of the Chamber, 1875–1890; employed by his brother in the grain trade; amassed a fortune in a comparatively few years; one of the organizers of the New York Corn Exchange; saved the government an enormous amount of money by his purchase of supplies for the Army during the Civil War; portrait presented by his family, painted in 1891 by Eastman Johnson.

Drake-Smith, Daniel—No. 117 (1818–1887). Member of the Chamber, 1858–1887; whole business life connected with
